• COURSE DESCRIPTION

• Catalog Description

This course is the first semester of Spanish language instruction. The course aims to develop skills in listening, speaking, reading, and writing, as well as to expose students to the diversity of cultures in the Spanish-speaking world.

- Pronounce and spell words in Spanish;
- Communicate through the use of some basic phrases;
- Respond with proficiency in a few familiar everyday situations using the proper register (formal or informal);
- o Identify and define everyday words and verbs in original texts and conversations;
- Read simple texts in the present tense and write short compositions on familiar topics;
- Conjugate verbs for the appropriate subject in the present indicative tense;
- Identify the function of the Spanish and English parts of speech;
- Describe the role of each element in a simple Spanish or English sentence;
- o Identify some aspects of the Hispanic legacy in contemporary American culture;
- List and define some of the major cultural contributions of the Spanish-speaking people in the areas of music, literature, film, and fine arts.

• ASSURANCE OF LEARNING

The course is delivered via: a) **classroom instruction**; and b) the online platform from the book publisher –**iLrn**. Students will develop their reading, writing and listening skills in Spanish, and will gain a solid foundation of basic vocabulary. Students will also gain an understanding of basic grammatical items and concepts through reading, writing, speaking, and listening.

Before each class, students are expected to go over the textbook pages assigned, <u>study their</u> <u>content</u>, and complete the assigned activities. As well, a quiz will be administered at the end of each chapter. In order to complete the iLrn online assignments and exams, the student needs to purchase the Access Kit from the bookstore/publisher's website.

It is important to study and review daily since the acquisition of a second language is a cumulative process and requires a solid foundation of previous material in order to incorporate new information. It is very important to realize that language isn't learnt but acquired. Students are expected to spend a minimum of 9 study hours weekly to succeed. The teaching approach that will be used in class is "flip the classroom".

• COURSE OUTLINE

• Sequence of topics to be covered

- *Capítulo Preliminar (¡Bienvenidos a la clase de español!*). The Spanish alphabet. The textbook. Numbers 0-100. Objects in the classroom. Classroom commands.

- *Capítulo 1 (¿Cómo te llamas?*). Exchange personal info (e.g. phone number, address, age, etc.). Introduce yourself and others. Greetings and good-bye. Make a phone call. Address people formally and/or informally. Write a personal letter.

- *Capítulo 2 (¿Qué te gusta hacer?*). Likes and dislikes. Personality traits and comparing yourself to others. Ask and answer questions. Leisure-time activities. Nationalities.

- *Capítulo 3 (¿Qué clases vas a tomar?*). Exchange information about courses and schedules. Tell time. Present activities and future plans. Possessions. Ask and answer questions.

- *Capítulo 4* (*¿Te interesa la tecnología?*). Computers and technology. Colors. Likes and dislikes. Describe people, emotions and conditions. Current activities. Say how something is done.
- *Capítulo 5 (¿Qué tal la familia?*). Talk about and describe your family. Professions. Daily routines. On-going actions.

• Examinations

There will be five exams, each pertaining to a chapter of the book (excluding *Capítulo Preliminar*). Each exam, administered at the end of every chapter, will consist of all the content included in such chapter. The exams will take place during class time, and the format will be similar to the online assignments. Additionally, there will be a final examination.

o Final Examination

The final exam will be comprehensive, and will follow a similar format as the chapter exams. It is mandatory in order to pass this course and, in compliance with MSSU policies, is not subject to be re-scheduled.

o iLrn

Online assignments will be posted on the publisher's online platform "iLrn". In order to complete the online activities/assignments, students will need to purchase the Online Access Kit cited on the "required texts" section. Once purchased, students must create their student account following the instructions provided in the packet. Then:

- 1- enter the following code to enroll in this course: PHXXAF744
- 2- Make sure you enroll under section 04.

Once enrolled, students can see when assignments are due by checking the calendar that appears in the course homepage/dashboard. Assignments due dates are already posted; there will always be due the day before class (Sunday's, Monday's, Tuesday's, and Wednesday's).

Assignments can be completed as many times as desired, as long as it is before the due date. <u>The score for each assignment will be calculated based on students' most recent attempt</u>.

• EVALUATION / GRADING POLICY

The grade in this class consists of a set of six categories:

- a) Sets of iLrn assignments;
- b) Five "chapter" exams administered in class (either handwritten and/or online);
- c) Two oral exams;
- d) A participation and attendance grade;
- e) An in-class composition;
- f) A Final Exam.

Letter grades will be assigned using the standard 90, 80, 70, 60 percentage scale:

- Attendance & Participation 12 %
- Composition 5 %
- Oral exams 13 %
- iLrn assignments 25 %
- Exams 25 %
- Final Exam 20 %

• Policy on late work and/or extra credit

Online assignments are to be submitted on the days that they are due by 11:59 p.m. CT. Assignment due dates are posted ahead of time, providing students with plenty of time to complete them. Thus, **no late submissions will be graded**.

• INSTRUCTOR POLICIES

• Attendance & participation expectations

Attendance will be monitored daily (every class period). For each time the class meets, students will receive either 0, 5, or 10 points. Students who show up on-time with automatically receive 10; students who are late 1-15 minutes (according to the instructor's iPhone clock) will receive 5 points; students who are late 15+ minutes or absent will receive a zero. At the end of the semester 3 zeros (due to excessive tardiness or absences) will be waived. This is done to not punish students for missing due to sick

day, car-broke-down day, etc. There will be no excused absences after a 3rd one, so I suggest you come to class and save those 'waived' days in case you truly need them. Students who leave early will be penalized with 5 points. Students who do not do their work during class, disrupt the class, speak English constantly, etc. will see their grade negatively affected. Students are expected to do their work, participate actively with the class and their classmates, take initiative, stick to Spanish, etc.

Spanish vs. English

If you want to acquire the target language, you must stick to it during class. You must develop the ability to think in Spanish. There is no other way around it, as research has proven so far. For that reason, I will expect you to communicate in Spanish from the beginning. Keep structures and communication simple. It will be tedious at first, and highly mechanical. That is ok – this is Span 101, first semester.

• Oral exams

There will be 2 oral exams, which will be administered in groups. In order to perform well in these exams, it is key to not only study daily, but especially to speak Spanish in class every day.

• Expectations for readings prior to class

If a student has questions related to other information or course materials, please contact the professor as soon as possible for clarification –regarding assignments, always 48 hours prior to the due date.

• Email/Text Message etiquette

Students are expected to read through all of the information and materials provided for the course. **I will not reply to any questions regarding information that is already on this syllabus.** Students are expected to introduce themselves when sending an email or text –basic courtesy, and to explain their case/situation thoroughly.

Student concerns

Students having a question, concern, or complaint about the course should follow the "chain of command" –discuss it with the professor first. If, for whatever reason, the issue was raised but not resolved, the student should then communicate such question, concern, or complaint to the Chair of the Foreign Languages Department.
